

PPEF leverages fun night for funds

After a year of changes at the district level, the Pilot Point Educational Foundation looked to continue raising money for Pilot Point students the way it knows

The annual Fundraising Gala and Auction, in its 25th year as of Saturday, is the only fundraising event the foundation holds each year gathering, last year, over \$70,000 for students and staff.

"We're very fortunate to live in pilot point because we've been able to raise tremendous funds over the last 25 years," Educational Foundation President Lee Ann Ray said. "We don't have all the totals in yet but are guessing in the mid \$55,000s."


Ray said some of the big-ticket items included a trip to Broken Bow, a fishing trip in Colorado, a \$1,000 case of homemade wine and matching set of twodozen cinnamon rolls from Monica David that sold for over \$600 dollars each.

"That's quite a lot for cinnamon rolls, but that just goes to show the generosity of the people of Pilot Point," Ray said.

Both the cinnamon rolls and the fishing trip were doubled by the donor at the last minute to encourage further dona-

"We're here to support our alma mater and have a great time," Kyle Blalock said. "We bought the Colorado trip last year, so we'll see if anyone can outbid us for it."

The auction lineup featured items donated both by local businesses and individuals and things donated by grade lev-

Aubrey moves ahead with stations

Construction is moving forward on Fire Station No. 3 for the Aubrey Fire

The winter weather has caused some delays for the construction.

"I know we normally like the rain, but in this one instance we don't need

it," AFD Chief Eric Schlotter said. More work has been done to prepare for the building foundation.

"If you've gone by there, you can see the work that's going on," he said. "It's starting to take shape and you can tell where the building is going to be now."

He also discussed plans for Fire Station No. 2, which he hopes will be ready for a construction bid in March.

"The funding for that station was received yesterday—\$5 and 1/2 million, Financial Director Mike English said.

Longtime member of the Aubrey

earned a promotion to be the department's first assistant chief and as commander of the APD operations bureau.

"He has been an integral part of the success of APD," Chief Richard Brooks said. "From the moment we met, we've shared a vision for Aubrey PD, which has made my transition into my role so successful. ... You all know him and the level of professional service he provides the citizens we serve and that he provides you."

Brooks also announced the promotions of Daniel Huerta as the community outreach and education sergeant and of Ryan Downs as a sergeant in the patrol division.

Brooks also announced a change to the speed to correct "a safety issue on Sherman Drive."

"This has been a journey, so tonight I'm very excited to announce the jour-

The change will make the speed 45 mph from U.S. 377 to Blackjack Road.

At Blackjack Road through to the school zone, the speed limit will be 30

The school zone in front of Aubrey Middle School will be 30 mph when in effect and 45 mph outside of those hours to Blackjack Oaks Road.

Leanne Wilson, the director of public works and development services, introduced Public Works superintendent Miguel Gutierrez during the meeting.

The council also approved the refunding of the Jackson Ridge Public Improvement District, which was handled by Jim Sabonis of Hilltop Securities and the PID management team.

"Gentlemen, I just want to say good job for your team in saving our tax-

Council condemns downtown building

The city council received a telling report about the state of the pair of dilapidated buildings on the north side of the Square at its Feb. 22 meeting after code enforcement joined a building inspector and engineer in a walkthrough.

Code Enforcement Manager Leo Bonanno pulled no punches in his report on the small building wedged between Notoriously Yours and the big red building on the corner.

"102 is an imminent hazard to the public, as in it wouldn't surprise anyone that visited that building if it were to tip over," Bonanno said. "All of us in there that day were really uncomfortable."

The building consists of a front and back façade, a roof and a floor that is "more kindling than floor," Bonanno said, with the external walls of its neighbors acting as its own

"We discussed this afternoon even closing off a portion of the sidewalk because the front is tipping over onto the sidewalk," Bonanno said "The file has been left with our attorneys, ... they are going to examine what has been done before and recommend a plan for moving forward.

City Manager Britt Lusk gave additional insight as to legal action.

"Council has given the direction to go to district court with it and, in talking with [city litigator Will Pruitt] today," Lusk said. "Once we get the documentation, ... it could be two weeks before he would be ready, so it's a pretty short turnaround for Will. Once he gets the documentation, he needs to get it to district court."

The big red building next door on the other hand is in better shape, Bonanno said, still substandard but not an imminent hazard.

"Big Red does have some issues on the interior," Bonanno said. "There is fire damage

Denco 9-1-1asks for input

In the case of a cardiac arrest episode, access to an automated external defibrillator can help make a lifesaving difference.

For 9-1-1 dispatchers to help members of the public find and use an AED in an emergency, the Denco Area 9-1-1 District is asking residents to register the devices' locations on a free app or the district website.

"Denco is pleased to partner with the local public safety agencies to provide this additional resource for emergency response," Denco Area 9-1-1 District Executive Director Greg Ballentine said in a release. "By working together to create this crucial database, lives will be saved."

The app—PulsePoint AED—was built through a partnership between Denco and the nonprofit PulsePoint.

To add an AED to the database via the web-

Community forum draws over 100 visitors

More than 100 people gathered to give their input about what they want Pilot Point to look like moving forward on Saturday.

The city held the first of three community forums for the master plan process, asking input on items ranging from community priorities to plans for the downtown area to the current commercial landscape.

"The feedback is going to inform the next steps in the process, so Community Forum 2 is going to be built from the ideas that come out from here or the issues that people bring up," said Abra Nusser of LJA. "Whether it's traffic or certain roads or certain areas of town, that's really what we want to dig into in Community Forum 2."

The various stations throughout the room allowed participants to flow from one to the other, starting with the information about what area is already within the town's city limits, as well as what area is currently in the extraterritorial jurisdiction.

"People have told me this is a great process, this is a great idea," City Manager Britt Lusk said. "They're so appreciative to actually have an opportunity to say something, to have a little piece of the pie to say, 'This is the direction we think we should

Even the smallest Pilot

Point community members got involved.

Cannon and Harlowe Long shared their input on what they'd like to see in downtown Pilot Point. Cannon drawing an arcade and ice cream shop on the Square, with Harlowe seconding the vote for the ice cream shop.

Cannon's idea was "for kids to have more fun and have a variety of choices [of things] to do," she said.

Her grandfather, Development Services Director John Taylor, was on hand throughout the event to answer questions and to have conversations with partici-

"It's really helpful because, as the consultant will always say, the more people we have participate, the better the plan is," Tay-

Typically, 50 people attending a forum is a good sign.

City Planner Darrell Gentry manned the children's area and interacted with people of all ages who came through.

"It's an excellent turnout, and it reflects what the community thinks about this effort," he said. "It sends a very strong message that they want to see the kind of planning that has to be done for the future."

tel building," Bonanno said. "Since the old red building is not an eminent hazard to the public right now, what code compliance is going to do is step back and let them finish the project they're currently working on then get with them again to talk about Big

Mayor Pro Tem Andrew Ambrosio asked for further clarification on the Stafford's timeline regarding code enforcement's leniency.

"The longer we wait to get that building to compliance, the more it's going to deteriorate," Ambrosio said. "Have you considered putting a timeline on that?"

Bonanno explained one of his reasons for giving leniency was the city's current work streamlining and better codifying its own ordinances in addition to new legislation being reviewed by the state.

"The law is going to be updated because our stuff is pretty old," Bonanno said. "Once the new law passes, assuming it does, then I would go back to the Staffords. My goal is to just wait till the new law is in place. I don't want to throw any curve balls, that would not be fair to them."

Texas Attorney General Ken Paxton has filed a lawsuit against the Denton ISD trustees. Superintendent Dr. Jamie Wilson and two elementary school princi-

Lindsay Lujan, principal of Alexander Elementary and DISD director of special programs, sent an email that said, "We need to do our part for our Texas Public Schools! Here is a list of candidates and whether or not the[y] support or oppose Public School Education," according to Exhibit 1 of the lawsuit filed by Pax-

In it, she also encouraged the staff to register to vote in the Republican primary and to vote, adding that there would be coverage during the school day for teachers to vote on Feb. 21 and 26.

In another email cited in the suit, this one sent by Borman Elementary School Principal Jesus Lujan, coverage to vote was again mentioned.

He also wrote, "Voting in Republican Primaries is especially important because the votes cast in primaries inform issues that the party will prioritize," according to Exhibit 2. "... Thus, vote for candidates who support public education and school funding in the Republican primaries, no matter what your party affiliation is, Republican or Democrat."

He went on to encourage

"a 'purple' mind-

set in future elections, voting for the candidate that will support public ed and funding in the future, despite their party affiliation.

Now, mind you, I don't have a law degree, nor am I an expert about what qualifies as electioneering.

However, I don't see how the emails sent by those principals violates Sect. 11.169 of the Education Code that regulates

lowed to know how its employees vote in the ballot box. No negative repercus-

sions were threatened in the emails if the faculty and staff did not vote in the Republican primary. Now, our tax dollars as

Texans are being used to sue

Denton ISD, and the people who live within Denton ISD will bear the financial burden of this lawsuit.

While it likely wasn't the wisest use of the district's resources for the principals to send those emails, I think the state has become quite overbearing in regard to the voice people in public education have in helping shape the future.

Having a voice matters, and educating people is what educators do.

It's a sorry sight that they're being penalized for

payers \$13 million over the life of these bonds, Mayor Chris Rich said.

Also at the meeting, the council and public heard an update from Denton County Commissioner Ryan Williams regarding the transportation and expo center projects that will affect the residents of the Aubrey area.

"Aubrey will receive \$10 million in contributions, and that matches," Williams said of the TRIP '22 bond money approved by the Denton County voters, adding that those projects need to be confirmed by the city.

He also provided an

update on timing for three TxDOT projects-FM 2931 widening to four lanes is projected to let in February 2026, FM 1385 widening to six lanes to let in July 2026 and U.S. 377 widening to six divided lanes to let in September 2026-and a forum about the delays with U.S. 380 that was held Feb. 26.

"A lot of things happening in 2026 supposedly," Williams said. "That's the hope. These are all goals, as you know in government."

He also discussed the expo center the county is set to build near the intersection of Milam Road

and I-35.

"A feasibility study shows the expo center should bring in \$34 million per year for the economic area," Williams said, adding it will accommodate 170 events and add 400 employees.

The council also approved a new three-year contract with All American Animal Control that has more specific metrics that the company needs to meet regarding animal control services within the service area.

"This item is a renegotiated contract that will replace the original contract signed on April 15, 2022," Brooks said.

Following a second executive session, the council voted to enter into a lawsuit against the Denton County Fresh Water Supply Districts with which Aubrey has a fire service interlocal agreement that is serviced largely by the Navo fire station.

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

Sims shares suggestions for making news

Vince Sims of NBC5 shared some insight into how small business owners can get their information out there.

Pitch information to local newspapers, contact reporters who work on a specific beat and find a way to provide helpful information were his suggestions.

"You think about, 'How can I get my business on the news?" he said, adding, "in a good way."

The reporters, producers and managers cull through local papers, social media and submitted suggestions to form those ideas.

"You have to first of all make the connection to get to the news," Sims said. "We're not really that hard to reach. I always tell people, first of all, we have the local paper that's here. You want to know how to reach them ... to make that contact."

He suggested finding the hook that will appeal to a media outlet and to keep the pitch direct and concise to increase the chance it will be acted

upon.

He used a plumbing company offering suggestions for winterizing pipes as an example of a hook. "We may not be able to use you then, but you're going to go into our system, and we'll be able to maybe use you down the line," he said.

Sims, who has been part of the NBC5 team for five years, is the weekend co-anchor and a reporter.

"I've been in the industry 30 years," he said. "... I love what I do because every day is something different. I become a daily

expert on something, be it road construction or crime or politics. I just never know what my day is going to be until I go in that morning."

Sims was the featured speaker at the PointBank Business Breakfast on Wednesday morning at PointBank President Ray David's invitation.


"Your favorite blooper?" David asked.

Sims recalled an experience early in his career when the cardboard background fell while he was live on the air in Monroe, Louisiana.

"I was delivering the news, and I just kept a stone face," he said, drawing chuckles from the crowd.

At the suggestion of his fellow NBC5 investigative reporter Eva Parks, Sims discussed isee@nbcdfw.com, "because we can't always cover everything," Parks said.

"If you send in some pictures and videos of an event or something that you have going on, that gives us the opportunity to air it on the news that way," Sims said.

Aside from the schol-



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
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Aubrey ISD makes headway on renovations

Aubrey ISD construction consultant Scott Nivens gave the board good news in his update on the high school and fieldhouse renovations at its February meet-

After the board addressed budgetary concerns during its previous meeting, Nivens returned on Feb. 21 with a look that sparked less concern.

"We had some additional Geo Tech done, and there were no changes," Nivens said. "We've still got two feet of undercut. I was happy about that. We got the contract document back for the fields; there were no changes in the prices, so we're in good shape

Nivens said the additional practice field, which the board previously pressed the growing district needed before sports got underway in the upcoming semester, is slated for completion by June 3.

"I suspect by mid-June we should have a good playable field," Nivens said.

Earlier in the meeting, the board received the End of Course education report from Deputy Superintendent Terrie McNabb wherein she discussed the value of tutoring for standardized test-

"Six students attended after school in algebra tutoring, and of those six, five passed," McNabb said. "That tells you that if they will participate in the tutoring, we've got great teachers. ... The board invests a lot of money in allowing us to hire tutors, and it really does help students."

She addressed the fact the new

House bill regarding tutoring for standardized testing makes it easier for parents to opt their students out of the supplementary commitment.

In the interest of further increasing the feasibility of getting students into tutoring, several members of the board brought up the possibility of offering it in the morning as well as after school.

"The problem I've heard from parents is we only offer it after school, and all the kids have extracurriculars and just couldn't make it work," board member Jody Gonzalez said. "They also said their kids aren't fully functional after an eight-hour school day to go through a tutorial at

four in the afternoon. They're spent. Maybe in the morning at least they'll be fresh."

Overall, the district rated at or above state averages for most subjects with a few exceptions on the End of Course and Texas Academic Performance Reports, both of which were presented at the meeting. The complete TAPR report is available online at the district's website.

"You'll be able to look at how we're doing as an entire district if you look at this," CTE Director Dr. Jonathan Lee said in reference to some of the early data.

Though available, all of the data is at least a year old due to how the state gathers the data.

The only requirement to register an AED into the database is an active email, the Denco release said, and "to ensure only valid AEDs are included in the 9-1-1 system, each database entry is confirmed via email and verified in-person by a public safety administrator, according to the release.

Those who are submitting a location can add a photo of the AED to help identify it.

"The registry integrates with the 9-1-1 system, allowing dispatchers to direct callers to the nearest defibrillator during a cardiac emergency," according to the release. "The project aims to increase the chance of

a bystander using an AED on a cardiac arrest victim, which can greatly boost survival rates.

Aubrey Fire Department Chief Eric Schlotter said all of the AEDs on city property have been logged with Denco Area 9-1-1.

Those rates, according to the American Heart Association, "can double, or even triple, when a bystander starts immediate CPR and uses an AED," the release said.

Although the use of the devices can save lives, they are typically only used in "10.2% of public [cardiac] arrests," ac $cording \ to \ the \ American \ Heart$ Association.

At that, bystanders typically use an AED 4.6% of the time, with first responders using one 19.1% of the time and EMS personnel 76.3%, according to the AED Fact Sheet.

In each AED box, the AHA said, there is a diagram to show a layperson how to apply the pads on bare skin, and each device provides audible step-bystep instructions once powered

A shock will only be administered if the device finds it necessary, according to the

"CPR should be stopped only while the machine is doing this analysis," according to the AED Fact Sheet. "If no shock is advised, it will tell you to resume CPR. If there is a shockable rhythm, it will deliver the shock and afterwards will tell you to resume CPR."

Early use of an AED within the first minute of a cardiac arrest, paired with CPR, helps victims have a roughly 90% survival rate.

"Your chance of survival while waiting for emergency medical services during a cardiac emergency decreases by 10% every minute without CPR," the fact sheet said.

The boys, he said, are no slouches either.


"Our varsity boys 4x4 broke our school record two weeks ago in Valley View and ended up finishing third in this meet," McCulloch said.

plenty of recognition and reputation and rightfully so," Jones said. "Peytyn Goodin had a lot of success last year and seems like she's only going to get better."


Jones said the competition for the season is nothing to sneeze at.

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




